It seemed that Giacomo Puccini's life was mapped out before he was born: his family had filled the role of Maestro di Cappella of the cathedral in Lucca, Italy for generations. Only six years old when his father died, he was not able to take up the mantel immediately but he did go into the family business, first as a chorister and organist in the cathedral, going on to study music at the Instituto Musicale Pacini in Lucca and then at the Milan Conservatory. Puccini composed his Messa di Gloria as his graduation thesis from Lucca in 1880 when he was just eighteen. The first performance was a great success, praised by critics and public alike, but Puccini filed it away and it was not heard again in his lifetime.

Four years earlier, in 1876 the young musician had walked the twenty miles from Lucca to Pisa and back to hear Verdi's opera Aida. It was this experience that prompted his decision to seek a career as a composer of opera. He is now remembered for masterpieces such as madame Butterfly and La Boheme, but he the fact that he kept the manuscript of his early mass shows he was proud of it, even reusing sections of the music in his operas.

It wasn't until 1951 that Father Dante del Fiorentino, an émigré Italian priest living in New York who had known Puccini when he was a young curate, was visiting Lucca to collect material for a biography of the composer. He came upon a copy of the mass and on his return home and organised the first American performance of it in Chicago in 1952, seventy-two years after its premiere in Lucca. Since that date the mass, full of youthful melody and joy, has become a popular work with choral societies.
