In March 1942 Benjamin Britten was returning to England following three years in the United States. During the voyage the ship berthed at Halifax, Nova Scotia, where he came across a book of poems in Middle English and some of these he set during the voyage as the 'Ceremony of Carols'. Now hugely popular, it is an unusual setting for high voices and harp. Britten was planning to write a harp concerto and so had been studying the instrument, and had with him a manual on writing for the instrument. The work opens and closes with the choir processing to plainsong (though today we do not process), and the other songs deal in a varied way with the traditional stories surrounding the birth of Christ.
